Each year, approximately 75 million Americans engage in recreational boating activities. Most boating experiences are positive – the stuff memories are made of. Those joyful times, however, can quickly turn tragic if boaters are not vigilant about safety.

In 2015, the U.S. Coast Guard counted 4,158 boating incidents that involved 626 deaths, 2,613 injuries and about \$42 million of damage to property. Compared to 2014, this was a 3% increase in injuries and an 8% increase in deaths.

The most important aspect of boating for everyone is wearing a life jacket, the lifeblood of safe boating. The U.S. Coast Guard reports 78% of boating deaths in 2016 were due to drowning, and 84% of the victims were not wearing a life jacket. Coast Guard approved life jackets are readily available at most sporting goods stores. In North Carolina, children younger than 13 must wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket at all times.

Most water-related risks can be easily avoided by running through a safety checklist before beginning any boating activities:

- **Make** sure the boat has a basic first-aid kit.
- **Check** that everyone on the boat has life jackets.
- **Keep** watch for any signs of severe weather.
- **Always** be aware of others on the water.

To further reduce the risks of potential accidents, the National Safe Boating Council recommends taking a boating safety course. Seven out of every 10 boating accidents are caused by operator error, many of which would be avoided with proper safety instruction.



Another simple step in avoiding hazards on the water is having your boat routinely checked. Many marinas and storage facilities offer inspections at minimal cost. These inspections can detect potential problems before they become an issue.

Finally, just like driving a vehicle, it is illegal to drink alcohol and operate a boat in all 50 states. According to the Coast Guard, nearly 50% of all boating fatalities involve alcohol.

On June 4, the Mooresville Town Board approved the Fiscal Year 2018-2019 Budget. The approved budget of \$99,235,682 includes no increase in taxes or monthly utility rates. The solid waste fee increases from \$5 to \$10 per month.

Below is a breakdown of the FY 2019 approved budget:

The Town aligns all its activities with the Town-wide Strategic Plan goals: (1) Customer Service, Transparency and Citizen Engagement, (2) Economic Development, (3) Organizational Excellence and Financial Stability, (4) Planning, Infrastructure and Housing, (5) Public Safety and (6) Recreation and Cultural Services.

The General Fund money (which provides funding for core town services) is \$69.2 million and represents a \$744 thousand (1.09%) budget increase from the FY2017-18 approved budget of \$68.4 million.

The General Fund portion of the budget includes funding for 10 new positions, 2 replacement Sanitation trucks, and 11 replacement Police vehicles.

The Utility Fund portion of the budget includes funding for one new position, a Northside Lift Station gravity sewer design, and a 2" waterline replacement project on Stewart Avenue.

The Stormwater Fund includes funding for one new position and a stormwater retention pond in the Cliffwood/Magnolia area.

Each local government operates under an annual balanced budget ordinance adopted and administered in accordance with The Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act.



Major sources of revenue for the Town are the ad valorem property tax and local option sales taxes. Ad valorem property taxes generate approximately \$36,800,000 of revenue. Property tax rates for Mooresville are \$0.58 per \$100. User fees for services, such as water and sewer, support the operation and maintenance costs of those systems.

Funds in the budget pay for the personnel and services provided by the Town to the residents. Safe drinking water, solid waste collection, recreational opportunities and public safety protection are among the many services provided by the Town.

Fats, Oils & Grease (F.O.G.)

When grease is washed down the drain, it sticks to the inside of sewer pipes (both on your property and under streets). Over time, it builds up and can block an entire pipe. Never pour fats, oils or grease (F.O.G.) down the drain.

F.O.G. discharged by residential, commercial and industrial users presents a problem for the Town's wastewater collection and treatment system. Commercial products that claim to dissolve grease may only pass it down the line.

Scrape all food and leftover grease into the trash, never into the sink.

Recycle large amounts of used cooking oil at the Iredell County Transfer Station.

Wipe pots, pans and dishes with dry paper towels before rinsing/washing.

Pour cooled F.O.G. into a can with a tight lid (ex. coffee can) and dispose of it in the garbage.

Do not use hot water to wash grease down the drain. When the water cools, F.O.G. will solidify and clog the pipes.

Do not use detergents to dissolve grease. They only disperse it down the line to recollect elsewhere and cause problems.

Do not put grease or greasy food into the garbage disposal.

Never pour grease or used oil into the storm drains or in the ground.

Dig Safely

If you are planning to dig on your property, follow these steps before doing so:

Call before you dig. State law requires you notify North Carolina 811 by dialing 8-1-1 or visiting NC811.org to have your utilities located at least three working days before you begin any excavation work.



Wait. At no cost to you, technicians will mark the utility line locations on your property. Once all lines are marked, you can then begin digging.

Respect the markings for your safety.

Dig with Care. If you accidentally hit a pipeline, no matter how minor it may seem, leave the area immediately and call PSNC Energy from a safe place at 1-877-776-2427.
